#### **Expansion of Stapleton**

Stapleton is in the very beginning stages of being expanded to 4-6 lanes. The plans do NOT include Stapleton between Towner and Meridian, which are outside of the project limits. The timing, of construction, is unknown at this time. Thus far, only the study has been funded. The focus of the study is to provide a framework to preserve right-of-way, establish an access management plan for the corridor, and identify potential environmental issues and mitigation strategies if any are needed. The study will also develop conceptual level design for the roadway and associated facilities. Together these pieces will position the project so that the planned roadway can be constructed in the future, consistent with county, city, and regional planning.

- 1. Upgrading the water system to ensure remote homes and new homes have proper pressures.
- 2. Rehabbing wells 8 & 5 or 10.
- 3. Placing wells 3 & 4 back online, they have not been used since 2007
- 4. Adding a garage at PH #3 for more storage of vehicles such as;
  - a. Portable emergency pump for the lift station
  - b. New tractor and mower, allowing the district to handle all landscaping, saving money
  - c. Adding a bay to handle all vehicle maintenance instead of outsourcing

#### **Preventing Frozen Pipes**

As we have moved into the winter months and cold temperatures, make sure to keep an eye on your water pipes and plumbing. Frozen pipes that break or burst can cause expensive water damage. Even a small tear in a water pipe can pour hundreds of gallons of water each minute into your home. As many homeowners take time over the winter holidays to visit family and travel, it is important to know what preventative measures you can take to help prevent frozen or burst pipes. Here are just a few tips to prevent frozen pipes:

- Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents, and pipes, and use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out. With severe cold, even a tiny opening can let in enough cold air to cause a pipe to freeze.
- Insulate pipes in attics or crawl spaces or better yet, use heating tape on susceptible pipes.
- Keep heat in the home at least 55 degrees and make sure you have good batteries in your thermostat.
- Allow faucets to drip if there is a concern of freezing, this will also take pressure off pipes.
- Insulate pipes that are in cold and drafty locations.
- Disconnect any outside hoses.
- Open cabinet doors to allow heat to get to un-insulated pipes under sinks and appliances near exterior walls.

Over the years, several homes in the District have suffered major damage due to broken pipes. Most problems arose when owners were on vacation and turned the heat too low or furnaces stopped working when rentals were vacant without appropriate heating. It can be a wise idea to shut the main valve where the water line comes into the house and drain the pipes if you are planning on being away for an extended time. 
#### Having a Homemade Valentine's

But if your child wanted to do something else Valentine's Day related, making an easy or special dessert may help yourself and give them a little treat as well.







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### A Sweet Treat for the Family

#### **Chocolate Cherry Brownie Bites**

- 1 box brownie mix 9X13 size eggs according to package directions water according to package directions oil according to package directions
- 1 10 oz. jar maraschino cherries drained (reserve juice for frosting) 1/3 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 5 Tbsp butter softened to room temperature
- 3 oz cream cheese softened to room temperature
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 Tbsp reserved maraschino cherry juice

#### Instructions

1. Mix brownie mix according to package directions with scoop the batter into a well-greased mini muffin pan.

- 2. Immediately after removing the brownie bites from the oven, press an indention into each one, using the back of a 1/2 tsp measuring spoon. While the brownies are still warm, place 3 semi-sweet chocolate chips into each center. Let the chocolate chips sit for a few minutes until softened, then gently press a maraschino cherry on top of the melted chocolate in the center.
- 3. Let brownies cool completely and then make the frosting. To make the frosting, use an electric mixer to beat the butter, cream cheese and powdered sugar. Once the mixture is well combined, add the reserved cherry juice and beat until smooth. Frost the brownie bites and enjoy!
