Many may have noticed the 3rd party processing fee for card payments has gone down. Paint Brush Hills worked hard to get a better processing fee from the 3rd party company. We were able to get the fee from \$3.95 or 3.95% down to \$2.50 or 2.5% whichever is greater.

If your account is still outstanding on the 18th of the month, PBHMD staff will post shut off notices on properties and assess an additional \$15.00 penalty fee to your account. Saving water reduces carbon pollution. That's because it takes a lot of energy to pump and treat your water. You can have a positive impact by taking shorter showers, turning off the tap while brushing your teeth, and switching to WaterSense-labeled fixtures and appliances. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates that if just one out of every 100 American homes were retrofitted with water-efficient fixtures, about 100 million kilowatt-hours of electricity per year would be saved, avoiding 80,000 tons of global warming pollution (https://www.epa.gov/).

One Pan Honey Lemon Chicken with Asparagus

Olive oil cooking spray

4 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless

Salt, to season

1/3 cup lemon juice, freshly squeezed

1/4 cup honey

- 1 tablespoon low sodium soy sauce (optional)
- 1 tablespoon garlic, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons parsley, fresh chopped, divided
- 1 teaspoon salt, to taste
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cracked black pepper, to taste
- 4 bunches asparagus (37-40 spears), woody ends removed
- 1 lemon, sliced to garnish

Instructions

Arrange oven shelf to the middle of your oven. Preheat oven 400°F. Line a baking sheet with foil or parchment paper and spray with nonstick cooking oil spray. Arrange chicken on the sheet and season with salt; set aside.

Combine together the lemon juice, honey, soy sauce, garlic, half of the parsley, salt and pepper. Pour three quarters of the honey lemon mixture over the chicken. Arrange the lemon slices over the top. Season with extra salt and pepper, if desired.

Cover with foil and bake for 20 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through. Uncover, arrange the asparagus around the chicken. Pour the remaining honey lemon mixture over the asparagus; season the asparagus with salt and pepper. Return to the oven to grill or broil until the chicken is golden and the asparagus is cooked. Garnish with the remaining parsley.

Serve with a side of rice or potatoes.
